Communities Resilience and Livelihood

Leave no one behind is the central, transformative promise of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

It represents the unequivocal commitment of all UN Member States to eradicate poverty in all its forms, end discrimination and exclusion, and reduce the inequalities and vulnerabilities that undermine the potential of individuals and of humanity as a whole.

Despite the adverse challenges affecting girls and women among them; cultural norms, limited resource allocation, lack of opportunities and underrepresentation, women have continued to strive in their businesses.

To this end, Echo Network Africa (ENA) has been collaborating with Mennonite Economic Development Associates (MEDA) through the Maendeleo Sawa (M-SAWA) project to enhance SMEs fish production through capacity building.

Women beneficiaries from four beaches (Wakula, Mrongo, Litare and Kaugege) in Homa Bay County have been furnished with fish production technological equipment. The equipment have enhanced fish production for women to increase their revenue streams, and improve their livelihoods.

This month, the MEDA team led by a representative from the Canadian Embassy and MEDAs Assistant Country Director visited one of ENA's beneficiaries, Litare Women Group to assess the initiative.

The women were eager to show off their skills and explain their engagement in ENA's initiative.

They demonstrated how they use equipment such as weighing scales, solar freezers, scoop nets, fish feeds processing machines, solar lamps/lights, and motor boats to generate income.

The development partners were inspired by the women's dedication and commitment to their work, and the positive impact our partnership has had.

Women Leaders Call for Unity & Peace amid Political Grand Standing

This month, Women Leaders under the auspices of African Women Leaders Network Kenya (AWLN) and Women Mediation Network Kenya (WMNK) raised their concern over the ongoing Political grandstanding in the country and the impact it has on vulnerable groups.

The women leaders emphasized that it is essential for all stakeholders to put aside their differences and work towards a common goal of building a better country.

"Mothers of this country are concerned about the ongoing grandstanding between Government and the Opposition. Ultimately, it is the women, children, persons with disabilities, the elderly and other vulnerable groups that suffer the most. Our economy is already suffering and cannot afford further strains. As women of Kenya, we are calling on Kenyans of goodwill to pull together and not tear the country apart" said Dr. Riria, Chairperson AWLN and GCEO ENA.

Dr. Riria added that the women leaders were concerned about the safety and security of thousands of families most of whom are women and children currently displaced from their homes and camping in tents, especially in the bandit-stricken Counties.

"Some women are giving birth in the camps and children have stopped going to school. We urge the Government and other humanitarian agencies to move swiftly and provide decent accommodation, food, medicines, and other critical services to these families and help curb further suffering," she said.

The women leaders thanked the President for appointing more women into leadership and specifically for appointing young women.

They however noted that Kenya is still lagging far behind in the pursuit for gender equality.

ENA Restoring the Girl Childs Dignity

Girls Excel Initiative

The current drought situation in Kenya has affected many livelihoods, especially in the ASAL counties, and Narok has not been spared. Families have continued to face numerous challenges including loss of livestock, lack of food, and inadequate supply of basic commodities.

Drought-led migration has also been rampant, with families moving in search of pasture for their livestock. This has led to girls and women being exposed to Gender Based Violence, abduction and forced marriage, while the girls are forced to drop out of school to concentrate on household chores.

In response to the dire situation, ENA, with support from United Nations Populations Fund (UNFPA) supported 568 girls with dignity kits and sanitary towels. The girls were drawn from six schools in Narok South Sub-county namely; Osupuko Oirobi primary school, Olosirua Primary, Olgilai Primary school, Olepolos primary school, Kuntai Primary school, and Naroosura Secondary school.

In addition to the supplies, the girls were engaged in a mentorship session that aimed to create awareness on Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights, Protection from Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) and Gender-Based Violence.

The sessions were also used to promote menstrual hygiene management amongst the girls.

In Naroosura Secondary school, the head girl gave an emotional message thanking the partners for the support. "This is the first time we have received such support and we are very grateful."

She noted that the students enjoyed the open conversation that was held discussing sexual reproductive health and encouraged the team to visit again to hold subsequent talks with the girls. In Kuntai Primary school, a young eloquent and confident fourteen-year-old girl shared the plight of girls and highlighted the negative effects of FGM. She noted that they are now equipped with the information on what to do when they are at risk.

It was clear that there was a lot of misinformation among the girls in all the areas of discussion and that such interventions were important to empower the girls and the community. Life skills, resilience building and linkages to information and services were noted as priority areas for the girls and women.

ENA Empowers Women in Meru County With Financial Literacy

Financial Inclusion

The majority of the poor in society are women due to cultural norms and values, gendered division of assets and power dynamics between men and women. Indeed, women and girls bear an unequal burden of unpaid domestic responsibilities and are overrepresented in informal and precarious jobs.

Women also possess inherent agency and knowledge that is overlooked by policy-makers as they form and implement poverty reduction plans. Development interventions continue to be based on the idea that men are breadwinners and women are dependents.

We also see that women in marginalized communities are more disadvantaged than women in urban communities. There are many reasons why financial access remains difficult for rural women: illiteracy, lower levels of education, lack of land ownership, lower income levels, lack of tangible assets or collateral, legal constraints, time and mobility constraints, socio-cultural constraints, inter-role conflicts from juggling

domestic and professional roles and a lack of market exposure. Accelerating women's financial inclusion thus requires bold and sustained action to advance women's economic opportunities and rights and to ensure that they can meaningfully participate in the economy without undue constraints and barriers that limit their progress.

It is in this regard that ENA through the Financial Inclusion Focus Area trained two women groups of 40 members, in Meru County on financial literacy, entrepreneurship skills, & Loan management. This was to help the women improve their livelihoods and enhance meaningful participation of women in wealth creation.

The women were also trained on the utilization of loan funds to boost their small businesses. On top of that, they were trained on best group practices to excel and position them to repay their loans and be eligible to apply for more funds in the future.

Promoting Peace at the Community Level

Peace and Conflict Resolution

In the coastal region of Kenya, the women peace actors have been making impressive strides towards promoting peace in their Community. Trained by Echo Network Africa with support from UN Women, these women have been working tirelessly to lead peace processes in their community.

In Mombasa County, the women peace actors organized several trainings that brought together different audiences, including some of the youth from Ziwa La Ngombe constituency who were active members of local gangs and involved in illegal activities.

Some of the young men and women who participated had recently been recruited into gangs, and the women peace actors were

about the gang practice of using young ladies as bait for unsuspecting individuals. To combat this issue, the women peace actors embarked on activities to interest the youth in productive work and help cease their criminal activities.

They met with the mothers of the youths who had cut ties with the gangs to offer counseling services and support in rehabilitating and reintegrating them back into the community.

The women peace actors also emphasized that peace campaigns begin at a personal level before spreading to the community at large. Members of the community were encouraged to embrace the 'Peace Starts with Me' campaign to ensure there is no violence and conflict at the community.
