ENA Transforming Lives of Women in Marsabit County

Community Resilience and Livelihood

Naitutum-Ngai Community Based Organization (CBO) embarked on a remarkable journey of empowerment in June 2013 as a self-help group comprising of individuals engaged in table banking, beads selling, and honey business. Recognizing the potential of this resilient group, Echo Network Africa (ENA) joined forces with them, bringing forth a transformative impact that would reshape their lives. Through ENA's guidance, the CBO received comprehensive training in group dynamics, financial literacy, capacity building, and business development, setting the stage for their extraordinary growth and success.

Collaborating with the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KNCCI), ENA facilitated market linkages for Naitutum-Ngai CBO, exposing them to new opportunities in outside catering and honey packaging.

As a result, the group expanded their horizons, unlocking untapped potential in these areas. This growth led to the official registration of Naitutum-Ngai CBO as a Community Based Organization in April 2021, marking a significant milestone in their journey.

Driven by their success, Naitutum-Ngai CBO has taken on a new mission to empower and uplift other women groups in Wamba. Currently, they are actively training 12 women groups on table banking, FGM, women's rights, and group dynamics.

These women groups include Naitubulu Self Help Group, Twiga Mamas Self Help Group, Nalojik Self Help Group, Naramat Women Group, Lmarti Self-Help Group, Naitajeu Self-Help Group, Lkilikwai Self Help Group, Nagwari Beekeepers, Omom Nasham Youth Group, Ecde Welfare, Nashipae Women Group, Samaletu Women Group, and Naitajeu Self-Help Group, which holds a special place as it comprises members living with HIV. Currently engaged in diverse ventures, including table banking, honey business, beadwork, outside catering, tent hire, and training facilitation, Naitutum-Ngai CBO stands as a testament to the transformative power of ENA's support. As they continue to evolve and create a lasting impact, Naitutum-Ngai CBO is a beacon of hope, embodying the true spirit of empowerment and community development.

DTF Mashinani – Strengthening Women's Leadership at the Grassroot Level

Women's Leadership, Political Participation and Governance

Echo Network Africa (ENA) has recently launched 'DTF Mashinani,' a ground-breaking initiative focused on mobilizing women leaders at the grassroots level to enhance their leadership abilities and address local issues more effectively. This initiative also provides a platform for women politicians to kickstart their journey towards the 2027 General Elections.

On 19 May 2023, during a remarkable multi-sectoral & Trailblazers meeting, women leaders from Machakos, Kitui, and Makueni counties in the lower Eastern region gathered to commemorate the launch of DTF Mashinani. This meeting, hosted by ENA in collaboration with Democracy Trust Fund (DTF) and with the support of Hanns with Seidel Foundation (HSF), marked a significant milestone in advancing women's participation in leadership roles.

Ms. Sarah Muhoya, ENA's Head of Women Leadership, Political Participation, and Governance, and the National Coordinator of Democracy Trust Fund, emphasized the importance of seeking women leaders from diverse sectors, including churches, chamas, marketplaces, farms, boards, communities, learning institutions, and trade unions. She encouraged the women to adopt a mindset of becoming solution providers, emphasizing the value of learning from those who are already making a difference.

Damaris Kariuki, the Lead for Gender Portfolio for Kenya and Ethiopia at HSF, highlighted the importance of recognizing that every aspect of women's lives is political or influenced by politics, regardless of whether they choose to participate in electoral politics.

Additionally, Grace Kioko, a 2022 Aspirant and DTF member, shared that unsuccessful candidates from the 2022 elections, who now have their sights set on the 2027 elections, have regrouped and initiated "Bunge la wanawake mashinani." Kioko expressed the need for ENA, DTF and HSF to support and empower this initiative called Bunge la Wanawake.

The launch of DTF Mashinani and the collaborative efforts between ENA, DTF, and HSF are undoubtedly instrumental in advancing the representation and leadership of women in Kenya. We are excited to witness the positive impact this initiative will have on creating a more inclusive and equitable political landscape for women in the country. Girls Excel Initiative

In 2018, ENA through the Girls Excel initiative set out to address the twin problems of teenage pregnancies and poor performance in Mathematics and Sciences subjects among girls in schools. Through a rapid survey to establish the status of uptake, retention and performance in STEM subjects as well as the rate of teenage pregnancies, the initiative identified Kithangari Girls Secondary School as the pilot for the initiative. The initiative also evolved over the years to be ENA's second incubation: To catalyze acceptance and commitment by communities to eradicate Female Genital Mutilation, Period Poverty, Teenage Pregnancies, and Early Marriages through accelerating the performance and uptake of STEM subjects among girls. Additionally, ENA has been instrumental in establishing Hesabu clubs in schools. These clubs have served as a platform for girls to engage in weekly discussions focused on STEM subjects.

This month, ENA joined the world in celebrating Menstrual Hygiene Day on 28th May 2023 with the theme - 'Making Menstruation a normal fact of Life by 2030.' ENA organized a menstrual hygiene management talk, and distributed menstrual hygiene management materials, to 500 students in Kithangari Girls Secondary School. Each girl received three packets of sanitary towels and three cakes of soap. The event was successfully spearheaded by our local implementing partner, Youth and Women Advocacy Network (YWAN). YWAN specializes in implementing Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights interventions for young people. Our collaboration with them aligns with ENAs strategy to be a catalyst for development, prioritizing the involvement of local organizations that deeply understand the challenges faced by community members. We are proud of the progress achieved so far and are committed to amplifying our efforts in empowering girls and normalizing menstruation.

AWLN Increasing Women's Participation in decision-making Processes

Special Projects

The African Women Leaders Network (AWLN) High-Level Intergenerational Dialogue on Women's Political Participation took place in Harare, Zimbabwe, bringing together women from the region, with over 300 participants and representatives from various countries among them Tanzania, Kenya, Malawi, and Seychelles. This two-day gathering, held on the 15th and 16th of May 2023, was inaugurated by Vice President H.E Dr. rtd. General C. Chiwenga, and aimed to achieve the objective to:

• Discuss the current status of women's political leadership in Zimbabwe.

- Share international and regional experiences in promoting women's political participation and
- Identify strategies and best practices for enhancing women's political engagement.

During the event, participants shared personal accounts of their experiences in political involvement and highlighted areas for learning and improvement. One notable innovation that received praise was Echo Network Africa's Democracy Trust Fund (DTF) model from Kenya, which was seen as a powerful tool to be replicated in other African countries. This model effectively drives women's economic empowerment and addresses gender inequalities in leadership.

Furthermore, there was a unanimous agreement that women in politics require investment throughout the entire electoral cycle. It was emphasized that grassroots engagement and partnerships with women in business are essential to support and empower women in politics.

Financial literacy, capacity building in fundraising and resource management, and the creation of more platforms for discussions involving women in key sectors were identified as crucial investments. These efforts aim to foster networking opportunities and a broader agenda focused on financing women in politics.

The dialogue was a significant step forward in promoting women's political participation, and the insights and outcomes will serve as a foundation for future endeavors in Zimbabwe and beyond. Furthermore, there was a unanimous agreement that women in politics require investment throughout the entire electoral cycle.
